Let’s celebrate the problem solvers, go-getters, dreamers, and doers who are creating a better future for us all. Just wait and see what they do next.

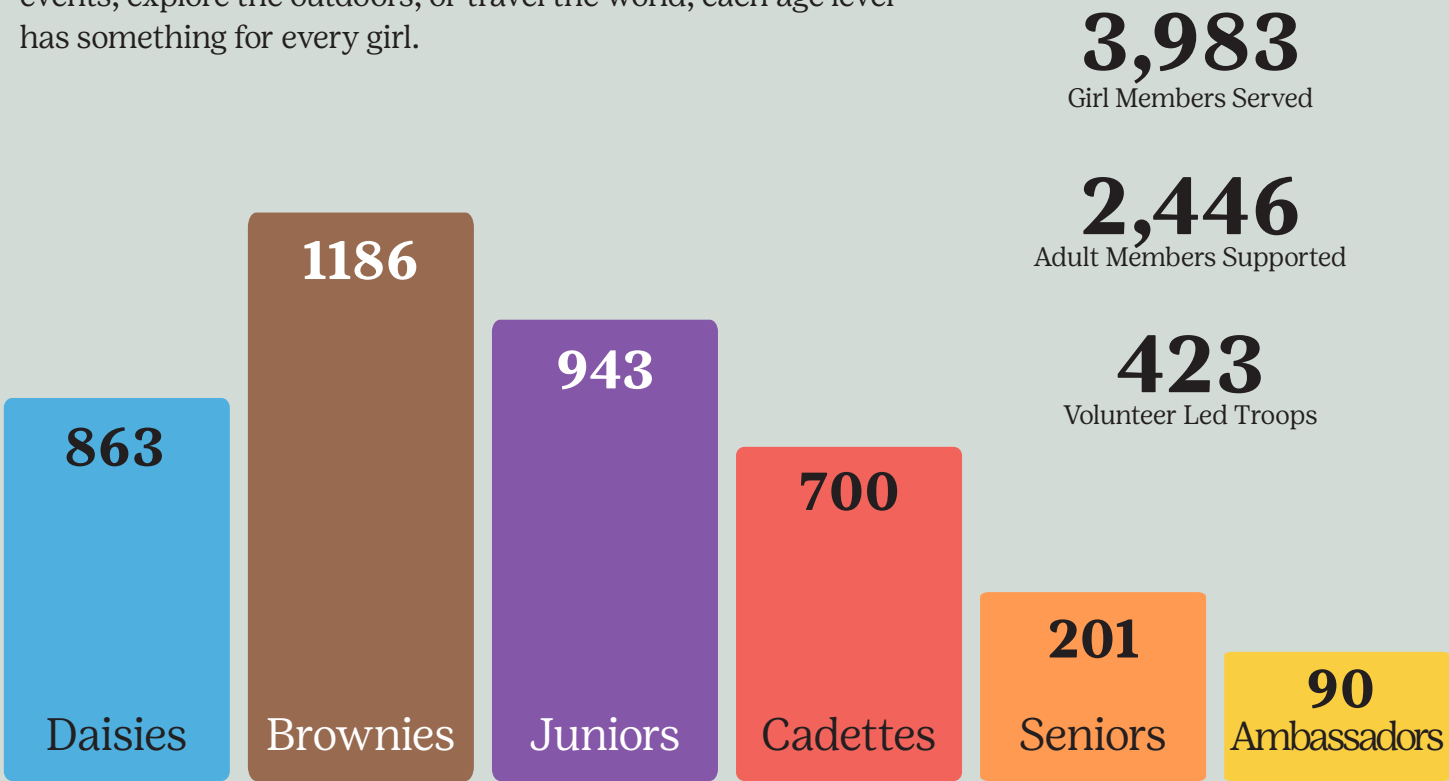


Membership

At Girl Scouts Lakes & Pines, we provide programming focused on outdoors, STEM, leadership skills, and entrepreneurship to give girls in our council the opportunity to grow their courage, confidence, and character.

This year, our programs included our signature events: Kaleidoscope and Our World, Our Family, along with events including Journey weekends, older girl retreats, Tap to Table, Dog Sledding, overnights at Seal Life and Great Lakes Aquariums, and so much more. We also welcomed the return of our travel programs with trips to New York City and Tennessee.

Summer Camps

Outdoor experiences are an integral part of the Girl Scout Leadership Experience for girls of all ages.

Outdoor activities are woven into the core leadership development program in such a way that girls feel comfortable trying new things and testing their limits, gain confidence, and acquire new skills in a safe and supportive all-girl environment. From swimming and horseback riding to canoeing adventures in the Boundary Waters and scaling the High Ropes course, Girl Scout camps are able to offer a variety of options for Girl Scouts of all ages.

Each summer Girl Scouts Lakes & Pines hosts day camp, resident camp, troop camp, and wilderness canoe trips at council properties. In addition, girls participate in volunteer facilitated outdoor experiences throughout the year at our council properties and service unit day camps.

The 2022 Cookie Season was an Adventure! Girl Scouts introduced a brand new cookie, Adventurefuls™, to the lineup. Girl Scouts creativity soared as sales methods expanded beyond in-person booths, online sales, and order cards; we saw everything from drive-through cookie booths, food truck stands, and more.

This year, 2,706 girls participated in our 2022 Cookie Season. Together our preparation, persistence, and creativity led to 831,522 packages of Girl Scout cookies sold, a .09% increase from the previous year.

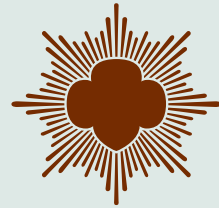

The Girl Scout Gold Award, Silver Award, and Bronze Award prove that girls have what it takes to build a better today—and tomorrow.



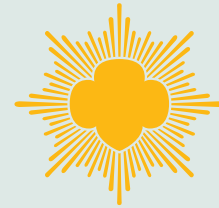
Bronze Award
